■ Learning objectives

■ Learning activities

Lesson plan: match the name of the river to the descriptions provided.

The Nore has been a prime fishing spot for centuries given the abundance of salmon and other fish in its waters. Cross over a bridge along the Nore and peer along the banks and there you will see fishermen waiting patiently for a bite. These fishermen and those before them gave names to favourite places along the river. These are marked as blue spots along the river on the poster. These names provide a link to the past and thanks to this poster will be remembered for all. Most of the names are in English, indicating that they are of not great antiquity. This is interesting because it means that each generation of fisherman added their own names to their favourite bend and stretches in the river. Sometimes the stories behind the names are known. Can you find the following names on the map?

Mouth of the O’Beag	Where a small stream called the O’beag meets the Nore. Fast water, excellent fished with a bait of worms. Salmon stood here having passed a series of rapids.
The Tail of the Bracken	The only place on the Nore to find Gudgeon is on the sandy bottom

		of the Bracken here.	
	The Shot	Water beginning to speed up after long slow run
